
Now you can upload personal documents in the PSA HR system



Prescription of Spectacles to National Health Insurance Scheme Members Starting Friday, 1 July 2022

Reference is made to the above subject matter.

Pursuant to section 5 of the National Health Insurance (NHI) Act No. 2 of 2018, the National Health Insurance Management Authority (NHIMA) is mandated to implement, operate and manage the NHI scheme. This includes developing guidelines, processes, and manuals for the effective implementation and management of the scheme.

To ensure the provision of quality health services to our members, a new patient flow has been developed that restricts the issuing of prescriptions for spectacles to accredited NHIMA Public and Private hospitals and clinics ONLY. Below are the steps our scheme members are supposed to follow:

- 1. Get a prescription from a NHIMA accredited eye / optical hospital/clinic after diagnosis
- 2. Present the prescription to the accredited optician
- 3. Optician will verify the prescription and send it to NHIMA for pre-authorization
- 4. Pre-authorization will be given by NHIMA to the optician within 48 hours
- Client then collects spectacles from the prescribing facility within 28 days

All members are therefore notified that with effect from Friday 1st July 2022, prescription of spectacles shall be restricted to Public and Private Hospitals / Clinic only. Therefore, this means that it will now be a mandatory requirement for a scheme member to first get a prescription from a NHIMA accredited public and private hospital/clinic that will present to a NHIMA accredited optician so that the optician can request pre-authorization to issue spectacles from NHIMA.

CIDRZ donates medicines and medical supplies worth over ZMW 7million to MoH through the USAID TBLON Project

The Centre for Infectious Disease Research in Zambia (CIDRZ) has donated assorted medical accessories amounting to seven million, four hundred seventy-nine, five hundred sixty-nine kwacha (K7,479,569) to the Ministry of Health (MOH) through Zambia Medicines and Medical Supplies Agency (ZAMMSA).

CIDRZ Deputy Chief Executive Officer (DCEO), Mr. Emmanuel Qua- Enoo, said the donation was made possible through funding from the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) under the CIDRZ Tuberculosis Local Organisations Network (TBLON) project.

Mr. Qua- Enoo added that over the last 3 years USAID, through CIDRZ, has awarded 10 million dollars to support the MOH in implementing the TB Programs in Lusaka and Southern Province, of which \$3.9 million has been used to support the Ministry of Health's country-wide COVID-19 response.

CIDRZ hands over the first ever Zambia National Non-Communicable Diseases and Injuries (NCDIs) Poverty Commission Report to MoH

The Ministry of Health (MoH) and the Centre for Infectious Disease Research in Zambia (CIDRZ) has launched the first Zambia National Non-Communicable Diseases and Injuries -NCDIs- Poverty Commission Report.

MoH Permanent Secretary for Technical Services Prof. Lackson Kasonka, said there is need to acknowledge that the national burden of Non-Communicable Diseases and Injuries (NCDIs) is a major health concern, and a huge strain on the health care system and the national economy. "The NCDIs are fast replacing infectious diseases and under nutrition as leading causes of disability and premature death in developing countries. NCDIs kill around 38 million people every year, accounting for 68% of all deaths worldwide and causing half of all global disability. Low and middle-income countries (LMICs) like Zambia are hit the hardest, with over three-quarters of all deaths occurring in these countries." Said Prof. Kasonka.

ZTA TRAINS CIDRZ SUPPORTED GOVERNMENT HEALTH CARE WORKERS IN 'THERAPEUTIC ART'

The Zambia Therapeutic Art (ZTA) has trained 12 health care workers in therapeutic art as a tool to use to address trauma experienced by adolescents living with HIV in the government health facilities supported by the Centre for Infectious Disease Research in Zambia (CIDRZ).

The 12 that were trained include three adolescent focal point nurses and nine adolescent peer educators from three government health facilities including Matero level 1 hospital, Chawama level 1 hospital and George rural health centre.

The 4-day ZTA children and young people's course is a novel approach that combines the use of a supporting and non-judgmental environment using clay, paper, paint, pencil etc. to enable children and adolescents to express their thoughts and feelings; and thereby aid recovery from the impacts of traumatic life events.

The hands-on experiential training covered a

wide range of therapeutic art activities which the trainees could implement in practice such as the use of stories and the engagement of the senses in using art materials.

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Sixty-Six (66) Trained in Safe and Ethical Index Testing (SEIT), GBV LIVES, Social Network Strategies (SNS) and HIV Self-Testing.

The Centre for Infectious Disease Research in Zambia (CIDRZ) through the United States Development Agency for International (USAID) Controlling HIV Epidemic for Key and Underserved Populations (CHEKUP I) Project has trained 66 public health care providers in Safe and Ethical Index Testing GBV (SEIT), LIVES. Social Network Strategies (SNS) and HIV Self-Testing.

The USAID CHEKUP I Project was launched for implementation in nine districts across the Copperbelt, Lusaka, Southern, and North-Western provinces with the goal of improving the health outcomes of Zambians by preventing new HIV infections among priority populations most at risk of acquiring HIV.

To beef up manpower, the project recently recruited a total of 74 Lay Counsellors and

148 Peer Educators across the seven supported districts (Lusaka, Livingstone, Ndola, Kitwe, Mufulira, Chingola and Luanshya). This Community HIV (CHIV) team will be the frontline for the project in ensuring that high impact HIV prevention services are offered to the individuals most at risk of acquiring HIV in the community.

She reaffirmed the government's commitment to collaborate with the US government and other stakeholders through relevant government ministries in order to address and improve all Zambians' health.

Mrs. Rosemary Masaku complimented CIDRZ on its 20-years of leadership in providing public health services in partnership with GRZ, and promised them of the government's support and collaboration as they implement this new program.

Meanwhile, Ms Arlene Phiri, USAID Zambia's HIV Prevention Advisor, expressed gratitude to the Zambian government for continuing to assist USAID Zambia and its partners. She stated that helping the people of Zambia would be difficult without it, as USAID exists to assist the government, and close partnership is essential.

She stated that the large number of

stakeholders present at the launch demonstrated that the project had been wellreceived in the province, and that partners were ready to work together during its implementation.

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CIDRZ Supports MOH with a Bioinformatics and Server Management Training for Sequencing Lab staff

The Centre for Infectious Disease Research in Zambia (CIDRZ) through the USAID TBLON Project is supporting the Ministry of Health (MOH) to increase access to COVID-19 genomic sequencing.

The project has trained eighteen (18) laboratory staff in bioinformatics and sever management which shall enhance the output from the Next Generation Sequencing for COVID-19. The training equipped participants with skills on how to use sequencing data to determine the strains of the virus in circulation in the target

population and if it has mutations that are of public health importance.

The trained laboratory staff have been empowered with the technical capacity to determine the prevalence of COVID variants that may be more deadly, infectious and with the capacity of evading the effect of the vaccines. This information is analysed and used to prepare the country's response to upcoming surges in cases (waves).
